Faith Formation



I am not sure if many of you know what led me to apply for the job as the Youth Coordinator at Trinity. I was ready for a change in careers and Debbie Bonner had mentioned that she was stepping down as Youth Coordinator. I became excited about the possibility of being able to take my love for my church and make a career out of it. I called Ron Watson (Pastor of Trinity at the time) and asked him his opinion, could I do this? He told me that he couldn't really give me any advice besides, "apply and see what happens." He later told me, "I never saw this coming."

This is one of my favorite things about God, more often than not, we never see it coming. (It being God's plan).

I shared with the youth a couple of Sundays ago, the scripture verse from Ephesians 3:20: "Glory to God who is able to do far more than we can ever think or imagine, by his power at work within us."

God is able to do far more than we can ever think or even imagine.

I know that a lot of you were shocked and saddened by the news of my resignation, but I want to remind you that God is good all the time and all the time God is good. I am not the church. This is the church, and this is the steeple, open the doors and see all the people.

You are the people.

You are the church.

I think Paul's letter in Ephesians 4: 3-13 sums up what we are called to do as members of God's church:

In light of all this, here's what I want you to do. . ., I want you to get out there and walk—better yet, run! —on the road God called you to travel. I don't want any of you sitting around on your hands. I don't want anyone strolling off, down some path that goes nowhere. And mark that you do this with humility and discipline—not in fits and starts, but steadily, pouring yourselves out for each other in

acts of love, alert at noticing differences and quick at mending fences.

⁴⁻⁶ You were all called to travel on the same road and in the same direction, so stay together, both outwardly and inwardly. You have one Master, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who rules over all, works through all, and is present in all. Everything you are and think and do is permeated with Oneness.

⁷⁻¹³ But that doesn't mean you should all look and speak and act the same. Out of the generosity of Christ, each of us is given his own gift.

This is the church, and you are the people. You have come to Trinity to worship God. You have come to Trinity to be a part of something bigger than just yourself and your individual faith. You have come to Trinity to be a part of a community of faith. Be the church! Use your gifts to grow God's kingdom.

I love each and every one of you and I cannot thank you enough for these past 8 years. Use what God has given you and watch as God's Spirit moves!

Trinity finances are in good shape at this point in the year. Our Revenue, which includes income from your giving, plus investment returns and use of Heritage Funds, is above plan. And total Expenses are below plan. We are very thankful for the generous gifts that all of you provide for the work of our church.

We also wanted to let you know that Trinity received a very generous estate gift in February. Session voted to add this gift to our Heritage Fund, where it will be managed in accordance with the approved process for Heritage Funds. The Heritage Fund is used by Session to support, maintain and strengthen ministries of our church, now and into the future. We have used some of these funds for operation of the church during the last 2 years, as well as for unanticipated expenses, such as replacing an air conditioning unit. Anyone can make an "above and beyond" gift of any amount to this fund at any time. Contributions come from estate bequests, stock or bond gifts, and gifts from retirement assets (such as 401K required Minimum Distributions) or annuities, IRA, 401K or insurance beneficiary designations, bonus earnings or any other source of income. If you are able, please consider supporting Trinity's future through a contribution to the Heritage Fund.

Nominations

Congregational Leadership is an important area of service in the Church. Each year, members of Trinity Presbyterian Church are called through the congregation to exercise a ministry of leadership within the Church as Elders and Deacons. These are distinctive leadership roles, calling for particular gifts and commitment.

The Congregation Nominating Committee (CNC) is seeking members to consider for service as Elders and Deacons. The committee asks the congregation to nominate members who have been regular in worship, active in the life of Trinity, generous in support of our ministry and faithful on their life and witness to the gospel. The CNC consists of: Jeffrey Cooke, Laurie Harrison, Cathie Huff, Gwen Levene (chair), Judy Murgitroyde, Jane Pellmann, Jason Wheeler, and a Deacon (to be named).

To make a nomination, simply contact a member of the CNC, complete a paper nomination form, or use the <u>Trinity On-line Nomination Form</u>.



All nominations will be considered by the CNC. We will call nominated candidates for an in-depth, meaningful discussion of any position suggested. The ultimate

slate of officers will be set by the CNC to be presented at the annual meeting or at another designated congregational meeting.

Elders The Session is the governing body of the congregation. It currently consists of 12 Elders who serve staggered 2-year terms. The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)'s Book of Order describes the office as follows: Elders should be persons of faith, dedication and good judgement. Their manner of life should be a demonstration of the Christian gospel, both within the church and in the world. It is the duty of elders, individually and jointly, to strengthen and nurture the faith and life of the congregation committed to their charge. Together with the pastor, they should encourage the people in the worship and service of God, equip and renew them for their tasks within the church and for their mission in the world, visit and comfort and care for the people, with special attention to the poor, the sick, the lonely and those who are oppressed.

Deacons The Board of Deacons consists of 19 members who serve staggered 2-year terms. Deacons undertake ministries of care and compassion within and beyond the congregation. Some of the responsibilities of this office are to care for a flock of members throughout the year.

The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)'s Book of Order describes the office as follows: The office of deacon as set forth in Scripture is one of sympathy, witness, and service after the example of Jesus Christ. Persons of spiritual character, honest repute, of exemplary lives, brotherly and sisterly love, warm sympathies, and sound judgement should be chosen for this office. It is the duty of deacons, first of all, to minister to those who are in need, to the sick, to the friendless, and to any who may be in distress both within and beyond the community of faith. They shall assume such other duties as may be delegated to them, from time to time, by the session, such as leading the people in worship through prayers of intercession, reading the Scriptures, presenting the gifts of the people and assisting with the Lord's Supper.



Presbyterian Counseling Center (PCC)

Did You Know the Presbyterian Counseling Center (PCC)

Started over 37 years ago in our community by First Presbyterian Church of Daytona Beach in Volusia County and now has counseling services in Flagler and Seminole Counties, too. PCC provides counseling services at ten locations, eight of which are in Volusia County, including an office at Trinity Presbyterian Church. As PCC continues to grow and meet the needs of the community, we strive to provide affordable, quality, and relevant behavioral health services to individuals, children, couples, families, and groups.

Everyone should have the support needed to feel safe, secure, and thrive. As our world continues to become more sophisticated and fast-paced, we are seeing an increasing number of individuals sharing concerns about feeling stressed, vulnerable, and traumatized. May is Mental Health Awareness Month. We want to take advantage of this month to highlight the importance of starting conversations around our mental wellness and encourage anyone who may be struggling or experiencing a mental health condition, we are here.

Of course, understanding the risk factors for a mental health condition can be more difficult when it's your own mental health. Take time to ask yourself about your thoughts, feelings, and behaviors to see if this is part of a pattern that may be caused by a mental health condition. Here are some questions to get you started:



- Have things that used to feel easy started feeling difficult?
- Does the idea of doing daily tasks like making your bed now feel really, really hard?
- Have you lost interest in activities and hobbies you used to enjoy?
- Do you feel irritated, possibly to the point of lashing out at people you care about?

If you are concerned about your mental health, there are several options available. You are not alone – help is out there, and recovery is possible. It may be hard to talk about your concerns, but simply acknowledging to yourself that you're struggling is a really big step. Taking a screening at mhascreening.org can help you to better understand what you are experiencing and get helpful resources. After that, consider talking to someone you trust about your results, and seek out a professional to find the support you need. If you are aware that your mental wellness and health need attention, PCC is here to help and is ready to receive your call at 386-258-1618.



What is Pentecost?



On the Day of Pentecost we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.) The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or Shavuot (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost ("50th day") by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit (see Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3).

Pentecost is new creation

An excerpt from the *Companion to the Book of Common Worship* (Geneva Press, 2003, 117-119):
According to the Day of Pentecost story in Acts 2:1-13, God gave the gift of the Holy Spirit to empower witnesses to the resurrection. Sounds from heaven, cosmic language, the rush of a mighty *ruach* (wind, spirit, breath) invaded the house in which the apostles gathered, and appeared to them as a burning fire. Tongues of fire touched their nerve centers. A power — the unseen power of God — moved among them and gripped them. The Holy Spirit is unseen, like the wind, which is why the Old Testament calls it *ruach YHWH*, "the wind, or breath, of God" (cf. John 3:8). The Spirit is the "unseenness of God" working among us....

The book of Acts tells the story of the outcome of Pentecost's new creation: people witness in word and in deed to the risen Christ. At the outset, the newborn church immediately tumbled out into the streets to witness to God's mighty works in the languages of people all over the world. By the end of the story, a tiny, Spirit-filled community of faith that broke from its present order has spread across the continents with incredible power to bring new things into being. With the gift of the Spirit, all things are possible. ...

Therefore, on the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate God's gift of Holy Spirit which draws us together as one people, helps us to comprehend what God is doing in the world, and empowers us to proclaim, in word and in deed, God's plan of reconciling all people in the name of Christ (Ephesians 1:10).

Without the gift of the Spirit, Christ's church dries up and withers away, and we are left with only our broken selves. With the gift of the Spirit, all things are possible. Trinity Sunday



On Trinity Sunday, June 4, 2023 we will proclaim the mystery of our faith in the triune God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit, One-in-Three and Three-in-One.

The celebration of Trinity Sunday began among Western Christians in the 10th century and developed slowly until it was formally established on the Sunday after Pentecost by Pope John XXII (1316-1334).

Unfathomable mystery

An excerpt from the *Companion to the Book of Common Worship* (Geneva Press, 2003, 149-150)

Unlike other festivals in the church's liturgical calendar, Trinity Sunday centers on a *doctrine* of the church, rather than an *event*. It celebrates the unfathomable mystery of God's being as Holy Trinity. It is a day of adoration and praise of the one, eternal, incomprehensible God.

Trinity Sunday, in a sense, synthesizes all we have celebrated over the past months which have centered on God's mighty acts: Christmas-Epiphany celebrating God's taking flesh and dwelling among us in Jesus Christ; Easter celebrating Christ's death and resurrection for us; Pentecost celebrating God the Holy Spirit becoming our Sanctifier, Guide, and Teacher. It is, therefore, a fitting transition to that part of the year when Sunday by Sunday the work of God among us is unfolded in a more general way.

The triune God is the basis of all we are and do as Christians. In the name of this triune God we are baptized. As the baptized ones we bear the name of the triune God in our being. We are of the family of the triune God. We affirm this parentage when, in reciting the creeds, we say what we believe. Our discipleship is rooted in the mighty acts of this triune God who is active in redeeming the world.

The triune God is the basis of all our prayers — we pray to God the Father, through Jesus Christ, by the Holy Spirit. The Trinity holds central place in our faith. ...




