Dear Members and Friends of Trinity Presbyterian Church,

At Trinity Presbyterian Church, we are committed to reaching Palm Coast for Christ and renewing lives by grace. This vision, which is both exciting and lofty, causes us to think strategically about the mission and ministry of our church.

To that end, we wanted to let you know that **beginning Sunday, September 2, Trinity will offer one traditional worship service at 10:00 am.** The Session believes this time change will help us better serve our members and regular attenders as well as make us more welcoming to visitors in our community.

While we recognize that such a change may inconvenience some of you, we have been hearing consistent feedback over time that our worship times make it difficult for our members and friends to participate in both Worship and Sunday Morning Classes at Trinity Presbyterian Church. We are hopeful that combining our traditional worship services will allow more participation in both Worship and in educational opportunities – thus creating a path toward being renewed by God’s grace. We are also cognizant of those who wish to participate in Sunday worship, but for whom a later worship service interrupts the flow of the day, and we hear the Bible’s call to value our days and make the most of the time.

With any change in worship patterns, there is relief as well as some pain. We hope and trust that these approved changes will help to unify our congregation as well as facilitate growth. Some have been asking for this change for years. Others have indicated a loyalty to our congregation’s worship, no matter what the hour may be.

What has not been mentioned is our Contemporary Worship Service. A number of worship options are being discussed at this time. For now, we invite those who have grown accustom to contemporary worship to join us in worship at 10:00 am.

What a joy it is to gather together as a church family to glorify God and to make God’s glory known in Palm Coast! We look forward to worshipping with you at 10:00 on Sunday, September 2.


### Discipleship Class

Reformed and always Reforming

## Our misused motto

*Ecclesia reformata, semper reformanda!* Even to this day, these ancient words are a rallying cry for Presbyterians and other Reformed Christians. It is a motto that reminds us of who we are and who we intend to be.

But what does this phrase really mean? It is used as a springboard in all kinds of contexts and conversations, sometimes with little sense of how it arose and what it meant among the Reformed folk in the 16th and 17th centuries. It is appropriated in times of disagreement and pressed into the service of our own agendas. It is even sometimes wielded as a weapon against those who differ from us, as if to say, “My position is more reformed than your position!”

This saying should indeed be a watchword for us, but we need a heightened sense of its meaning and the challenge it puts before us. Used without attentiveness to its historical context and import, it loses much of its power to challenge us.

### What the Reformers meant

Our Reformed motto, rightly understood, challenges both the conservative and the liberal impulses that characterize our diverse church today. It does not bless either preservation for preservation’s sake or change for change’s sake.

In the 16th-century context the impulse it reflected was neither liberal nor conservative, but radical, in the sense of returning to the “root.” The Reformers believed the church had become corrupt, so change was needed. But it was a change in the interest of preservation and restoration of more authentic faith and life — a church reformed and always to be reformed according to the Word of God.

The cultural assumption of the Reformers’ day was that what is older is better. This is strange to our contemporary ears. We do not share this assumption; if anything, we applaud the new and “innovative.”

But one of the serious charges church authorities hurled at the Reformers was that they were “innovating.” John Calvin responded to this and other charges in his treatise “The Necessity of Reforming the Church.” As he put it, “We are accused of rash and impious innovation for having ventured to propose any change at all [in] the former state of the Church.” He then goes on to counter that they were not “innovating,” but restoring the church to its true nature, purified from the “innovations” that riddled the church through centuries of inattention to Scripture and theological laxity.

The appeal was to a more ancient source, Scripture — “*sola scriptura*” (Scripture alone). According to church historian David Steinmetz, by submitting themselves to Scripture, the churches of the Reformation movement were purging themselves of these unwanted “innovations” and returning to a more ancient and therefore purer form of church life.

# LIFT EVERY VOICE

*On Sunday, August 26<sup>th</sup> our High School Youth led worship based on their experience at Montreat Youth Conference 2018 with the theme Lift Every Voice. Please enjoy reading their sermonettes based on what they have been led to share with you.*

“You can’t please everyone. When you’re too focused on living up to other people’s standards, you aren’t spending enough time raising your own. Some people may whisper, complain, and judge. But for the most part, it’s all in your head. People care less about your actions than you think. Why? They have their own problems!”

That’s a quote from author and activist Kris Carr. She’s battling stage 4 vascular cancer in the lining of the blood vessels in her liver and lungs. Only point-oh-one people with cancer in the world have this type of cancer.

So, it could be easy for her to say “forget it. I give up.”

But she doesn’t. She’s still writing books and still giving speeches...and still fighting an inoperable cancer living inside her body.

And I thought -I- had problems!

Truth be told, all of us heading to Montreat had problems. And all of us heading to Montreat didn’t talk about our problems. Until we got to Montreat.

Funny how that works. We’re not exactly excited about sharing with those we sit next to in school...or on the bus...or in church. But put us in a room of strangers? We are sharing machines.

The theme this year at Montreat was “Lift Every Voice.” It was based on the story of Jesus healing the paraplegic man who was lowered down through a hole in the roof of a house. So many people were surrounding Jesus, the man’s friends could not get the man close enough to Jesus. They had a problem...saw a solution...and here’s the important part...they acted on their idea.

The end result was a hole in a roof and their friend getting up and walking out of that house.

We were able to establish, among us all up at Montreat, that everyone comes with their own baggage. This is not a “teenager” thing. This is an “everybody” thing. We are just fortunate enough to be provided a time and place to open up our suitcases of baggage and hang it all out for the world to see. Maybe because we’re too young to realize we should keep that stuff hidden. We’re told we’re too naive to believe just talking with our peers can actually solve problems.

And you know what? Maybe we are. But maybe, it’s just that we’re young enough, and fortunate enough to know what we don’t know and are willing to put ourselves out there.

Last Valentine’s Day the world changed for all of us our age. It took just six minutes for seventeen students and staff at Marjorie Stoneman Douglas High School to be mowed down by a single gunman, an 18-year old with his own baggage.

There had been school shootings before this day...and there have been school shootings after. But following this particular act of violence, students across our state...and across our country stood up and said, “We’ve had enough.” We are talking now. We’ve found our voice and we realize -we- are the future so it’s time we start taking an active role in shaping the world in which we will...and I’m glad you’re all sitting down now....a world in which we will soon be taking charge of.

Each time I head to Montreat, there is a part of me who dreads the unknown. No matter how many times you head to the mountains, the experience is different. Not better...not worse...just different. All of us handle the “unknown” in different ways. This time around, we’ve taken the message of lifting every voice...no matter how small, or quiet, or big, or loud...each voice must rise.

The message I give to my Trinity family is this: we all have problems and we all are struggling with how to deal with them. I’m 17 and I do not have all the answers...or even most of the answers. But I do know that by talking with and not at people is the first step in solving a problem. I refuse to see three or four hundred problems in my church. Instead, I see three or four hundred solutions here.

Finally, I leave you with this. It’s a quote my dad helped me find from a man he interviewed a few times back when he did that kind of stuff on television.

“The one thing that can solve most of our problems...is dancing.” James Brown.
